Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund seeks to achieve moderate income through investment primarily in equity and fixed income securities of Canadian companies.

To achieve its mandate, the Fund invests primarily in securities of dividend or distribution paying Canadian businesses without restriction as to sector. These securities include preferred shares, common shares and securities of real estate investment trusts. The Fund also invests in fixed income securities of Canadian businesses, including corporate bonds, and may invest in government bonds.

The portfolio advisor primarily uses a bottom-up approach, seeking to identify preferred and equity securities issued by stable companies. In order to maximize yield while minimizing risk, the portfolio advisor evaluates the financial condition and management of each company, its industry and the overall economy.

All of the Fund's objectives and strategies are further described in the simplified prospectus of the Fund.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

Results of Operations

For the year ended at June 30, 2025 (the “period”), the Series A shares of the Fund generated a total return of 10.8%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund’s benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmarks, the S&P/TSX Composite Index and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned 26.4% and returned 6.1%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund’s mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund’s blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 50% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned 15.9% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund underperformed the blended benchmark due to security selection in Information Technology, an underweight and security selection in Materials, and an overweight in the Real Estate sector.

The Canadian equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory. The Canadian economy navigated a path of moderate growth and disinflation, creating a supportive backdrop for equity markets.

The Canadian economy achieved a “soft landing”, with GDP growth remaining positive but subdued. Consumer spending held steady, and the labor market, while easing slightly, remained resilient with unemployment staying below 7.5%. Inflation steadily declined, reaching the Bank of Canada’s 2% target by early 2025, driven by falling energy prices and easing supply chain pressures.

This disinflationary trend allowed the Bank of Canada to cut interest rates twice in early 2025, bringing the policy rate into the 2.5%–3% range. These cuts improved financial conditions, lowered borrowing costs and boosted investor sentiment, particularly in rate-sensitive sectors like financials and real estate.

Despite global headwinds – including U.S. policy uncertainty and trade tensions – Canada benefited from a repeal of the digital services tax and a thaw in U.S.–Canada trade relations, which helped stabilize exports. Commodity prices, especially for copper and gold, surged, supporting the resource-heavy TSX.

While business investment remained subdued, technology stocks outperformed and the broader economic environment – marked by

low inflation, falling rates and stable growth – fuelled a strong equity market rally.

Ten of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology, Materials and Financials. The only negative performing sector was Communication Services.

Over the period, the Canadian dollar weakened against the Euro currency, British pound and Japanese yen, and remained flat against the U.S. dollar.

The U.S. equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 14.6%. The period witnessed equity markets generate double-digits returns as the U.S. held presidential elections, inaugurated President Trump who announced tariffs to the world, while the war in Ukraine persisted and turmoil in the Middle East continued.

President Trump’s initial proposal of tariffs sent shockwaves to both equity and bond markets. The signal from the markets was that this would send inflation and interest rates up, weaken consumer and business confidence and trigger a recession. Though President Trump did dial back the tariffs from his initial proposal, tariffs did go into effect on Canada, Mexico and China, as well as on autos, steel and aluminum. This did have an impact on economic growth as the U.S. economy contracted at an annualized rate of 0.5%. This was largely driven by anemic growth in consumer spending and exports. This marks the first quarterly decline since 2022.

On the monetary side, the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) cut interest rates three times reducing the Federal Funds rate from 5.5% to 4.5%, from September to December. There have been no rate cuts yet in 2025 as Fed Chair Jerome Powell continues to gauge the effects tariffs will have on the inflation front. So far this year, inflation has gone from 3% in January to 2.4% in May, still above the Fed’s target rate of 2%. Some Fed officials have said a rate cut could be on the table in their next meeting depending on what the economic data looks like.

Nine of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Financials, Utilities and Communication Services. The worst performing sectors were Health Care, Energy and Materials.

Over the period, the U.S. dollar weakened against the Euro currency, British pound and Japanese yen, and remained flat against the Canadian dollar.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, returned 6.1% for the 12-month period ending June 30, 2025. The 10-year Government of Canada yield dipped down to 2.9% in September before rising into the year-end. It fell to 2.8% in March and ended the period at 3.3%. The Bank of Canada (BoC) continued to cut rates with a 25 basis points (bps) rate cut in both July and September followed by a jumbo 50 bps cut in both October and December. Another two 25 bps cuts in 2025 brought the overnight rate to 2.75% by period end. Within the U.S., the 10-year Treasury yield dipped down to 3.6% in September.

Following Trump's election victory, bond markets experienced a volatile sell-off driven largely by the anticipation of inflationary policies and bigger deficits under the new administration, leading to a rise in U.S. Treasury yields. The Federal Reserve began its own easing policy with a 50 bps cut in September, the first cut since emergency easing ended during the pandemic. They then followed with two more 25 bps cuts in November and December before keeping the funds rate steady throughout the first half of 2025. The Fed's cautious stance reflected persistent inflation pressures and uncertainty surrounding the economic impact of new trade policies.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofA Canadian and U.S. corporate indices OAS (Option-Adjusted Spread) widened out in July and August before narrowing to period tight by the 4th quarter. In the U.S., credit spreads saw additional pressure in Q2 due to renewed tariff announcements by the Trump administration, which raised concerns about corporate margins and global trade flows. However, spreads gradually narrowed into June as markets adjusted to the policy environment and risk appetite returned, particularly in investment grade.

The Fund maintained an overweight in equities (which includes alternatives) and an underweight in bonds. Over the period equities and bonds were both decreased as cash saw a corresponding increase to a high single digit percentage weighting. Geographically the Fund continues to favour North America with the allocation to Canada rising while the U.S. was notably lowered by the end of June. Both Canada and the U.S. were positive contributors to returns, with Canada having the greater impact.

Most of the Fund's fixed income allocations saw small changes though the exposure to foreign bonds, held in U.S. Treasuries, were reduced. Overall, the fixed income component was a solid contributor to performance, largely due to holdings in Dynamic Short Term Credit PLUS Fund, which offers an attractive yield and the 1832 AM U.S. \$ Investment Grade U.S. Corporate Bond Pool.

Among equities the largest sector weightings were in Financials, Energy (which includes Energy Infrastructure) and Consumer Discretionary. Over the period the allocation to Materials and Energy rose while Health Care, Consumer Staples and Communication Services were reduced. Most other sectors were relatively unchanged. Financials, Energy and Consumer Discretionary were the most notable contributors to performance with Health Care a small detractor at the sector level. Individual security contributors included Royal Bank of Canada and Toronto-Dominion Bank with holdings in Thermo Fisher Scientific Inc. and Rogers Communications Inc. had a negative impact on returns.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$81.3 million at June 30, 2025, from \$79.9 million at June 30, 2024. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$6.9 million, and investment performance of \$8.8 million and cash distributions of \$0.5 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or are likely to materially affect the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a "Related Broker"). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$2,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which shares of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, custody, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when shareholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter and Cecilia Mo, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for

securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are split equally among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or

affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

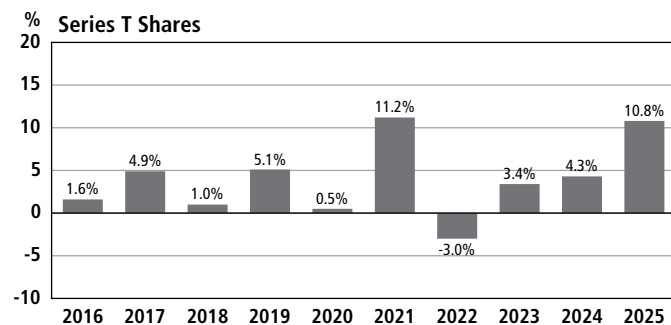
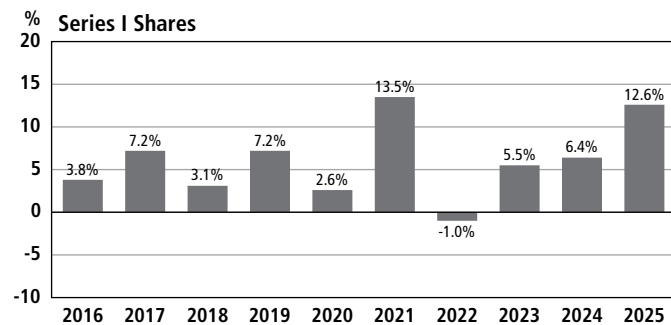
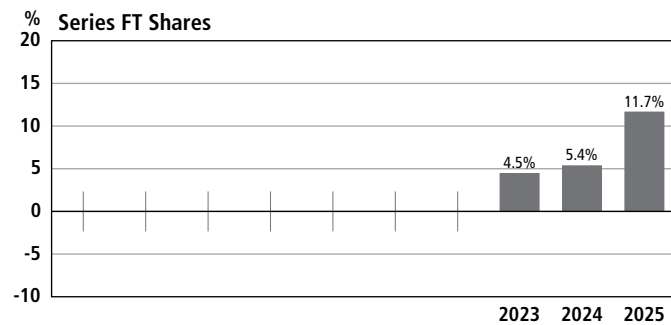
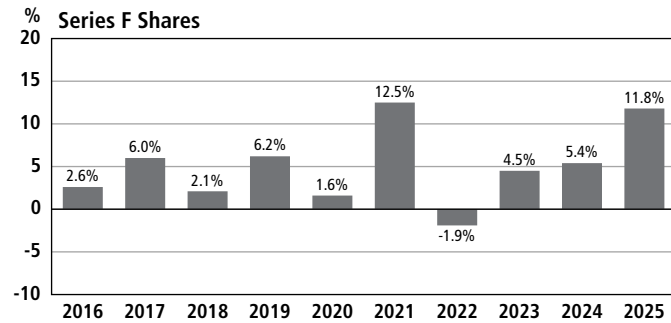
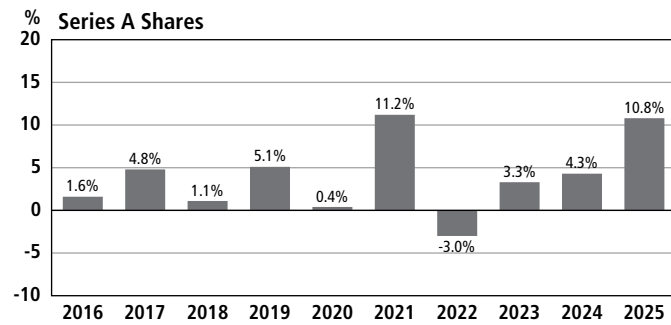
Past Performance
