1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the Fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Dynamic North American Dividend Private Pool.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended at December 31, 2025 (the "period"), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of 7.6%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the "Past Performance" section for the performance of the Fund's other series.

The Fund's broad-based benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index returned 19.5% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to this broad-based index to help you understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund's blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 50% S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 15.7% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Canadian equity market ended the six-month period in positive territory, with the S&P/TSX Composite Index returning 19.5%. The index rose meaningfully, driven by stronger commodity prices and a supportive policy setting, despite modest real economic growth.

The Bank of Canada resumed its rate-cutting cycle, including an October move that lowered the policy interest rate to 2.25%. While debate persisted about the pace of further reductions, easier policy helped anchor valuations and lift risk appetite in interest-rate-sensitive segments of the market.

At the same time, inflation moderated and labour markets softened. U.S. tariff hikes announced in April remained a source of volatility, with periodic negative headlines. However, exemptions under the Canada–United States–Mexico Agreement (CUSMA) kept most Canadian exports duty-free. The elevated tariff environment sharpened the focus on cross-border demand and pricing power, influencing earnings expectations for exporters and import-competing industries.

Ten of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the six-month period. The best-performing sectors were Materials, Financials and Information Technology. The only negative sector was Industrials.

The U.S. equity market ended the 6-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 11.9%. After a volatile first half of 2025, the second half can be characterized as a risk-on sentiment where the rally was broad based across most sectors.

The U.S. economy expanded at an annual rate 4.3% in the third quarter, the highest growth rate in two years, exceeding forecasts. Consumer spending grew at an annual rate of 3.5% in the third quarter, up from 2.5% in the prior quarter, driving economic growth.

Despite a resilient economy with strong GDP growth, the labour market struggled as the unemployment rate inched up to 4.4%, leading the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) to cut interest rates three times over the period from 4.50% to 3.75%, which is now at a three-year low. Fed Chair Jerome Powell said he was hopeful that the Fed's cuts would help support better hiring conditions. Though inflation has not hit the 2% Fed target rate it has stabilized and remains under 3%.

Ten of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the six-month period. The best-performing sectors were Communication Services, Health Care and Information Technology. The worst performing sectors were Consumer Staples, Real Estate and Materials.

The Fund underperformed its blended benchmark over the period. The largest source of relative underperformance was the portfolio's underweight allocation to and security selection within,

Materials – which was the best performing sector in the blended benchmark given the outsized return for gold equities. The portfolio has traditionally not had exposure to the space but did add a position in Agnico Eagle Mines during the period. The other major source of relative underperformance was the portfolio's lack of exposure to growth-oriented names leveraged to artificial intelligence, which largely don't meet the portfolio's quality and dividend focus. This led to underperformance of the portfolio's holdings in Information Technology, Communication Services and Consumer Discretionary.

Financials was the top contributors to portfolio returns by a relatively large margin, driven primarily by Canadian banks. While Information Technology holdings lagged the benchmark, as noted above, it was still a top contributor as a number of the portfolio's quality holdings still had some exposure to artificial intelligence themes. Top individual contributors included Royal Bank of Canada, The Bank of Nova Scotia and Apple. Only Industrials and Communication Services finished the period notably negative territory. Industrials was also the worst performing sector in the benchmark, while weakness in Communication Services was largely due to Canadian telecom companies. Notable detractors included Telus, Intact Financial and Salesforce.

The portfolio's geographic mix shifted slightly, moving to a larger overweight position in Canada. This was largely done by deploying excess cash, as the U.S. weight remained little change. At the sector level, the largest increases were in Health Care, Communication Services and Consumer Staples. While additions to Health Care were largely U.S. focused, the latter two increased primarily through Canadian holdings.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$441.0 million at December 31, 2025, from \$403.9 million at June 30, 2025. This change was composed of net sales of \$4.5 million, and investment performance of \$32.8 million and cash distributions of \$0.2 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

Fund Mergers

On November 14, 2025, following securityholder and regulatory approvals, Marquis Institutional Canadian Equity Portfolio (the "Terminated Fund") merged into the Fund. As a result of the merger, the Fund acquired all the net assets of the Terminated Fund at fair market value in exchange for shares of the Fund and

the securityholders of the Terminated Fund became securityholders of the Fund. Except for an increase in net assets, there was no material impact to the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia (“Scotiabank”). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a “related party”). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm’s length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the “Management Fee” section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the “Fixed Administration Fee”) to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund’s financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund’s most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses (“Fund Costs”). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund’s most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series’ expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a “Related Broker”). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$26,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter and Cecilia Mo, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of

the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are split equally among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;

- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, did not rely on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

(2) The management expense ratio is based on the total expenses (including sales tax, and excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs) of each series of the Fund and a proportional share of underlying funds' expenses (mutual funds, ETFs and closed-end funds), where applicable, for the stated period and is expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value during the period.

(3) The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, short borrowing costs and interest on leverage of the Fund and the underlying funds, where applicable, expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value of the Fund during the period.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

The breakdown of services received in consideration of management fees for each series, as a percentage of the management fees, are as follows:





Past Performance
