1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Dynamic Value Fund of Canada.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

#### Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund seeks to achieve long-term capital growth by investing primarily in equity securities of Canadian businesses.

Investment analysis for this Fund follows a bottom-up approach, which emphasizes careful company specific analysis. Using a value investment approach, this Fund invests in companies that represent good value based on current stock price relative to the company's intrinsic value.

All of the Fund's objectives and strategies are further described in the simplified prospectus of the Fund.

#### Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

## Results of Operations

For the year ended at June 30, 2020 (the “period”), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of –3.9%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund’s benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index, returned –2.2% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to this broad-based index to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market.

The Fund underperformed the broad-based benchmark, due in part to security selection in the Information Technology and Materials holdings. Security selection in Health Care holdings was the largest positive contributor to performance relative to the benchmark.

The Canadian equity market ended the 12-month period in negative territory as the S&P/TSX Composite Index returned –2.2%. After a strong run in 2019, the Canadian equity market continued to rally in the first six weeks of 2020. That changed in late February when it became evident that the COVID-19 was going to spread across the globe and become a pandemic.

What followed was a near total shutdown of the global economy that drove equity markets into bear market territory within three weeks starting in late February. A bear market is defined as 20% or more decline in equities.

Central banks and governments around the world proactively stepped in to provide liquidity and a backstop to the economy. Central banks cut interest rates to historical levels and many implemented a Quantitative Easing (QE) program. QE is a bond buying program whereby central banks purchase bonds in order to inject money and jumpstart the economy. As well, governments did their part by delivering massive stimulus relief programs to provide financial support to their citizens.

The economic shutdown also caused the oil market to have its first ever negative oil price which was triggered by very minimal global demand, ample excess supply and very little storage capacity. Oil prices quickly recovered from negative territory but still remain at about 30% lower for the year.

In Canada, to no one’s surprise, GDP contracted in the first quarter by falling 8.2%. The Federal government and the Bank of Canada have signalled they will continue to be supportive and do their part in providing more stimulus for the foreseeable future to help in the rebuilding of the Canadian economy as it faces the issues of low oil prices and COVID-19 pandemic.

Four of the 11 GICS sectors posted positive returns over of the 12-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology (+85.6%), Materials (+24.9%) and Utilities (+10.5%). The worst performing sectors were Health Care (–54.5%), Energy (–24.6%) and Real Estate (–15.4%).

Over the period, the Canadian dollar weakened against most major currencies, including the U.S. dollar, the euro, the British pound and the Japanese yen.

The U.S. equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (\$CAD) returned 11.9%.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) announced a “whatever it takes” strategy of not only buying unlimited amounts of U.S. Treasuries and mortgage-backed securities, but also begin buying corporate bonds and corporate bond exchange traded funds (ETFs), which is unprecedented. This extraordinary action boosted investor confidence and ensued the U.S. equity markets to quickly rally off the March 23<sup>rd</sup> lows. The bear market lasted a little over a month.

The recent actions by the U.S. government and the Fed indicate policymakers are willing to do whatever is necessary in trying to contain the pandemic’s impact on the economy while setting the conditions for recovery.

Eight of the 11 GICS sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology (+41.3%), Consumer Discretionary (+17.1%) and Communication Services (+15.5%). The worst performing sectors were Energy (–33.5%), Financials (–10.5%) and Industrials (–5.4%).

Over the period, the U.S. dollar strengthened against the Canadian dollar, the euro and the British pound.

The Fund aims to identify and invest in high-quality Canadian equities, although the U.S. market represents an attractive opportunity to access sectors not well represented in Canada. The weighting to the U.S. was increased while exposure to the Canada was lowered. Geographically the U.S. was a positive contributor to returns while Canada detracted from performance. The Fund used a consistent foreign currency hedging strategy which detracted from performance.

The sector exposure within the Fund is diversified, with Financials, Information Technology and Industrials representing the top allocations. There were few notable changes to the sector composition as the weighting to the Information Technology was increased while Communication Services were lowered. Holdings in the Utilities and Real Estate sectors were added to the Fund. Allocations to Information Technology, Materials and Health Care were the largest contributors to returns with Financials and Energy detractors at a sector level. Individual security contributors included Franco-Nevada Corporation, Microsoft Corporation and Amazon. Holdings in Prairiesky Royalty Limited, Gildan Activewear and Suncor Energy had a negative impact on performance.

The Fund's net asset value decreased to \$1.2 billion at June 30, 2020, from \$1.3 billion at June 30, 2019. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$74.7 million, investment performance of -\$28.8 million and cash distributions of \$0.9 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

## Recent Developments

### **COVID-19**

The spread of the COVID-19 virus began in late 2019 and led to a subsequent and dramatic global shutdown by March 2020 of all but the most essential activities. Many businesses and schools were closed along with borders as mobility restrictions were put in place around the world. This generated significant headwinds for corporate and consumer income which led to an increase in financial market volatility. In late March, markets began to see a dramatic reversal with investors encouraged by the amount of stimulus being introduced into the financial system by global policy makers. Trillions of dollars of supplementary income, tax relief and lending backstops were put into place. This was joined by equally aggressive interest rate reductions, asset purchase programs and the installation of liquidity facilities by central banks. While 2020 is likely to encompass one of the deepest global recessions in history, the incoming data indicates that it might also be among the shortest in duration. Much depends on the evolution of a vaccine and the efficacy of delivering it to everyone around the world. For now, we continue to monitor the situation and the effects on the Fund.

### **Risk Rating Change**

Effective November 15, 2019, the risk rating of the Fund has been lowered from medium to low-to-medium. This change is in accordance with the Risk Classification Methodology mandated by the Canadian Securities Administrators. There are no changes to the investment objective or strategies of the Fund associated with the new risk rating.

## Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer,

and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

### **Management Fees**

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

### **Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs**

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

### **Related Brokerage Commissions**

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a "Related Broker"). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$143,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

### ***Distribution Services***

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager may also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

### ***Other Fees***

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

### ***Independent Review Committee***

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Carol S. Perry (Chair), Stephen J. Griggs, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. The main components of

compensation are an annual retainer and a fee for each committee meeting attended. The chair of the IRC is entitled to an additional fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

**Management Fee**

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

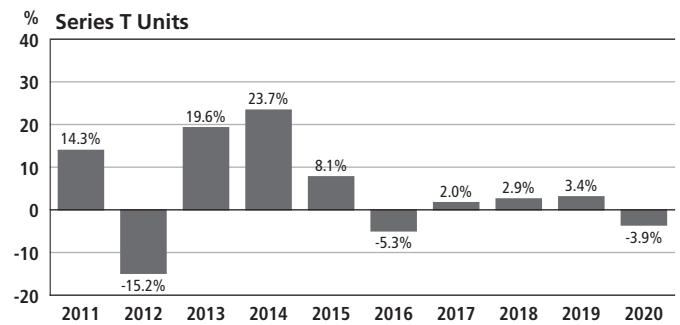
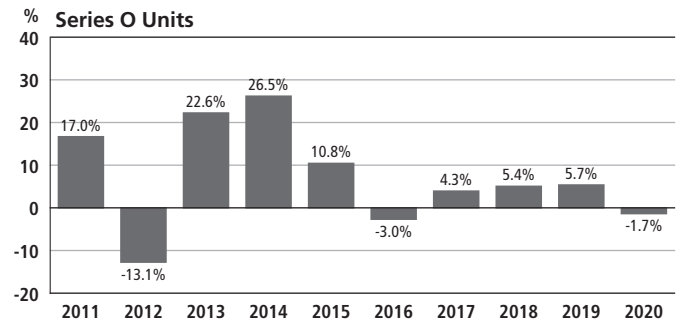

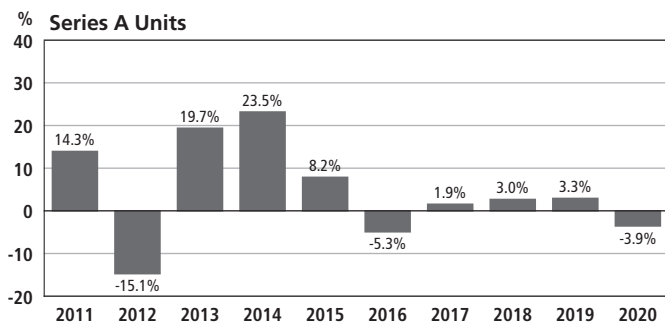
