1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Dynamic Dividend Income Fund.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund seeks to achieve moderate income through investment primarily in equity and fixed income securities of Canadian companies.

To achieve its mandate, the Fund invests primarily in securities of dividend or distribution paying Canadian businesses without restriction as to sector. These securities include preferred shares, common shares and securities of investment trusts. The Fund also invests in fixed income securities of Canadian businesses, including corporate bonds, and may invest in government bonds.

The portfolio advisor primarily uses a bottom-up approach, seeking to identify preferred and equity securities issued by stable companies. In order to maximize yield while minimizing risk, the portfolio advisor evaluates the financial condition and management of each company, its industry and the overall economy.

All of the Fund's objectives and strategies are further described in the simplified prospectus of the Fund.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

Results of Operations

For the year ended at June 30, 2020 (the “period”), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of 0.2%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund’s benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmarks, the S&P/TSX Composite Index and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned –2.2% and 7.9%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund’s mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund’s blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 50% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, returned 3.3% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund underperformed the blended benchmark due to security selection and an underweight in Materials, security selection in the Information Technology holdings and an elevated cash position.

The Canadian and U.S. equity markets ended the 12-month period in negative and positive territory, respectively. After a strong run in 2019 equity markets continued to rally in the first six weeks of 2020. That changed in late February when it became evident that COVID-19 was going to spread across the globe and become a pandemic. What followed was a near total shutdown of the global economy that drove equity markets into bear market territory within three weeks starting in late February. A bear market is defined as 20% or more decline in equities.

Central banks and governments around the world proactively stepped in to provide liquidity and a backstop to the economy. Central banks cut interest rates to historical levels and many implemented a Quantitative Easing (QE) program. As well, governments did their part by delivering massive stimulus relief programs to provide financial support to their citizens. In Canada, the Federal government and the Bank of Canada (BoC)

signalled they will continue to be supportive and do their part in providing more stimulus for the foreseeable future to help in the rebuilding of the Canadian economy. On March 23rd, the Federal Reserve (Fed) announced a “whatever it takes” strategy of not only buying unlimited amounts of U.S. Treasuries and mortgage-backed securities, but also begin buying corporate bonds and corporate bond exchange traded funds (ETF). This extraordinary action boosted investor confidence and ensued the U.S. equity markets to quickly rally off the March 23rd lows.

Four of the 11 GICS sectors in the Canadian index posted positive returns over of the 12-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology (+85.6%), Materials (+24.9%) and Utilities (+10.5%). The worst performing sectors were Health Care (–54.5%), Energy (–24.6%) and Real Estate (–15.4%).

Eight of the 11 GICS sectors in the U.S. index posted positive returns over the 12-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology (+41.3%), Consumer Discretionary (+17.1%) and Communication Services (+15.5%). The worst performing sectors were Energy (–33.5%), Financials (–10.5%) and Industrials (–5.4%).

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, rose 7.9% for the 1-year period ending June 30, 2020. Provincial bonds led the rally, up 9.4%, while federal government bonds and corporate bonds followed, up 7.2% and 6.6% respectively. The 10-year Government of Canada yield began the period at 1.47%. After a brief yield curve inversion in August, longer-term yields went on to rise to year-end. Yields dropped from January onwards and hit a low of 0.49% in May, after extraordinary measures were implemented by the BoC in response to growing fears over COVID-19. The BoC cut its interest rate three times in March and announced stimulus plans to purchase corporate bonds in order to stabilize and provide liquidity to struggling bond markets. The program was later updated to include the purchase of provincial bonds and real return bonds as the crisis continued.

Within the U.S., the 10-year Treasury yield curve also inverted briefly in August. The 10-year yield then fell to a low of 0.54% in March over pandemic fears. The Fed lowered rates three times in 2019, and then twice in March 2020, attempting to stabilize growing concerns over market liquidity. Following the Fed’s March 3rd rate cut, 10-year Treasury yields dropped below 1% for the first time since current tracking started in 1871.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofAML Canadian and U.S. credit indices OAS, rose in both February and March amidst the rising COVID-19 pandemic concerns. In late March, following the implementation of fiscal stimulus programs by governments across the globe, risk premiums and associated market liquidity began to normalize. By the end of the period, the North American investment grade markets reversed over half of the value lost from the market lows.

The Fund maintained an overweight in equities (which includes REITs and options) and an underweight in bonds. Over the period both equities and bonds were increased as the level of cash declined. Among equities the increase was primarily within the options component which provided attractive premiums in the latter half of the period. Geographically the Fund remained biased to North America with the allocation to both Canada and the U.S. decreasing, with Canada to a much greater extent. The U.S. was a positive contributor to returns with Canada having a smaller but negative impact on performance.

The Fund's bond allocation saw the addition of positions in the 1832 AM Investment Grade Canadian Corporate Bond Pool and 1832 AM U.S. \$ Investment Grade U.S. Corporate Bond Pool. The exposure to Dynamic Total Return Bond Fund was reduced while the weighting in foreign bonds increased and an allocation in Federal government bonds also rose. Overall, the fixed income component was a significant positive contributor.

Among equities the largest sector weightings were in Utilities, Health Care and Information Technology. Energy and Industrials were detractors to returns with Information Technology and Utilities making positive contributions at the sector level. Over the period, allocations to Financials, Industrials and Consumer Discretionary were lowered as Information Technology and Utilities increased. Individual security detractors included Keg Royalties Income Fund and Pembina Pipeline while Dynamic Total Return Bond Fund and Microsoft Corporation were significant contributors to returns. An overall portfolio hedge in place also had a negative impact on performance.

The Fund's net asset value decreased to \$428.2 million at June 30, 2020, from \$482.3 million at June 30, 2019. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$54.8 million, cash distributions of \$3.1 million and investment performance of \$3.8 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

COVID-19

The spread of the COVID-19 virus began in late 2019 and led to a subsequent and dramatic global shutdown by March 2020 of all but the most essential activities. Many businesses and schools were closed along with borders as mobility restrictions were put

in place around the world. This generated significant headwinds for corporate and consumer income which led to an increase in financial market volatility. In late March, markets began to see a dramatic reversal with investors encouraged by the amount of stimulus being introduced into the financial system by global policy makers. Trillions of dollars of supplementary income, tax relief, and lending backstops were put into place. This was joined by equally aggressive interest rate reductions, asset purchase programs, and the installation of liquidity facilities by central banks. While 2020 is likely to encompass one of the deepest global recessions in history, the incoming data indicates that it might also be among the shortest in duration. Much depends on the evolution of a vaccine and the efficacy of delivering it to everyone around the world. For now, we continue to monitor the situation and the effects on the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses (“Fund Costs”). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund’s most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series’ expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a “Related Broker”). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$39,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager may also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In

certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Carol S. Perry (Chair), Stephen J. Griggs, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. The main components of compensation are an annual retainer and a fee for each committee meeting attended. The chair of the IRC is entitled to an additional fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in

respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the

standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fee

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

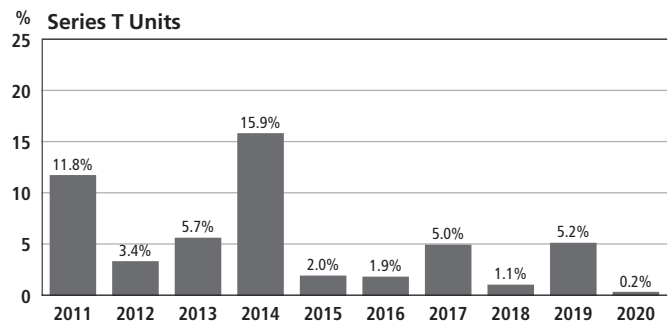
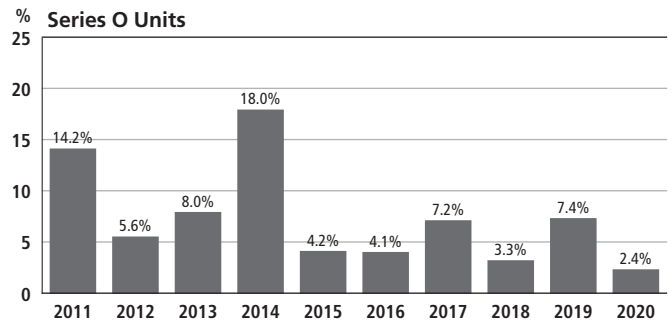
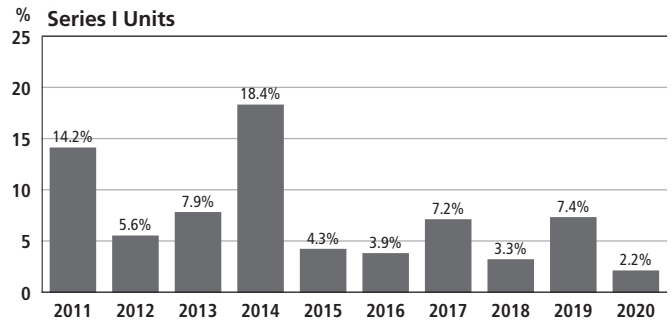
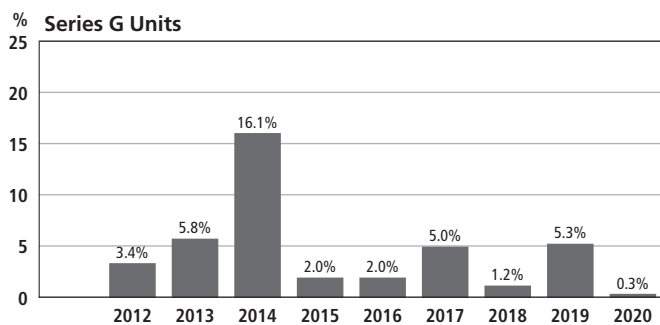
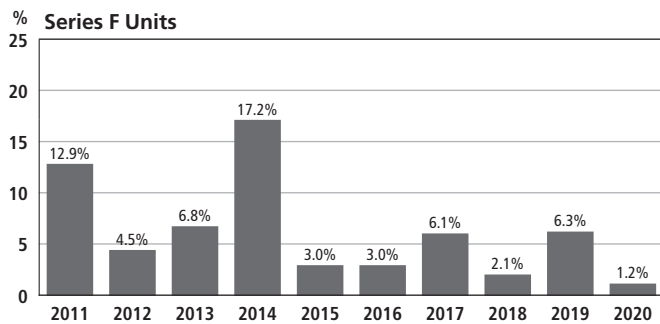
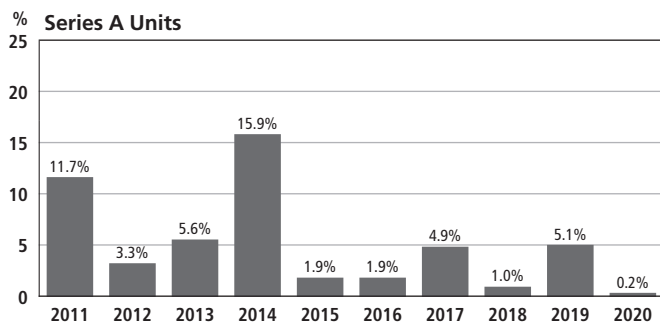

Index Descriptions

FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index – This index is composed of investment grade, fixed coupon, government and corporate bonds, issued in Canada and denominated in Canadian dollars, with a remaining term to maturity of at least one year. The index is weighted by market capitalization.

S&P/TSX Composite Index – This is a broad economic sector index comprising approximately 95% of the market capitalization for Canadian-based, Toronto Stock Exchange listed companies.
