1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Dynamic Dividend Income Class.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per share" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per share" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to shareholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Results of Operations

For the six month period ended at December 31, 2019 (the "period"), the Series A shares of the Fund generated a total return of 3.1%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the "Past Performance" section for the performance of the Fund's other series.

The Fund's broad-based benchmarks, the S&P/TSX Composite Index and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned 5.7% and 0.3%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market,

but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund's blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 50% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, returned 3.0% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund's performance was in line with the blended benchmark.

The Canadian equity market ended the 6-month period in positive territory. The Canadian economy remains resilient despite the fact a federal election resulted in a minority Liberal government, the Bank of Canada (BoC) did not cut interest rates and global trade tensions continue.

The BoC is one of the few central banks in the industrial world that did not reduce interest rates. BoC Governor Stephen Poloz says the current rate is 'about right' as inflation remains at their target rate of 2%, while unemployment is near a 45-year low.

In the latter half of the year we saw a rebound in the housing market due to lower mortgage rates. As well a new incentive for first-time homebuyers should continue to provide a tailwind for housing in the new year. Oil prices began rising as OPEC agreed to extend production cuts for the remainder of the year.

We had some positive developments on the global trade front. The U.S. and China agreed to a limited trade deal (phase one), which lowers some tariffs on China-imported goods and allows more access to U.S. farmers to sell goods in China. Also, U.K. Prime Minister Boris Johnson won a majority Conservative government that gives him a mandate to get Brexit done early next year.

In Canada, ten of the 11 GICs sectors posted positive returns over the 6-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology, Utilities and Energy. The worst performing sectors were Health Care, Consumer Discretionary and Consumer Staples.

The U.S. equity market ended the 6-month period in positive territory. The U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) turned dovish and cut interest rates three times. These rate cuts were looked upon as insurance cuts to keep the country's longest economic expansion running.

The Fed's actions had a positive effect on the economy. Mortgage rates fell to near all-time historical lows, resulting in a pickup in homes sales. The unemployment rate fell to 3.5%, which is a 50-year low. While wage growth did increase modestly, inflation remains mute.

On the global trade front, investors remained concerned about economic uncertainty surrounding the trade tensions between the U.S.-China trade war. This has resulted in companies scaling back on capital expenditures. Nevertheless, we did see some positive developments in the U.S.-China trade war, as both countries agreed to a limited deal (phase-one) in December. The

deal calls for China to buy more agricultural products from U.S. farmers. In exchange, the U.S. will halt adding new tariffs and reduce some tariffs on existing imported Chinese goods.

In the U.S., ten of the 11 GICs sectors posted positive returns over the 6-month time period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology, Financials and Communication Services. The worst performing sectors were Energy, Consumer Discretionary and Materials.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, inched 0.3% higher in the six month period ending December 31, 2019. Corporate bonds, up 1.2%, outperformed Federal bonds, down 0.3%, and Provincial issues, up 0.3%. The 10-year Government of Canada yield began the period at 1.47% before dropping to a low of 1.09% in August. After a brief yield curve inversion in August, longer-term yields went on to rise, although in a narrow range, to year-end. By the end of the year, the Canadian 10-year government bond yield had risen to 1.70%. Credit spreads in both the U.S. and Canada continued to rally during the second half of the year. High yield bonds, as represented by the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. High Yield Very Liquid Index, gained 4.1% in U.S. dollar terms.

The Fund held an overweight in equities (which includes REITs and options) and an underweight in bonds. Over the period both equities and bonds were increased as the level of cash declined. Geographically the Fund remained biased to North America with the allocation to the U.S. rising, the Canadian exposure unchanged and securities outside North America increased. Both Canada and the U.S. were positive contributors with the U.S. having the greater impact on returns.

The Fund's bond allocation was diversified with the largest sector allocations held in Energy Infrastructure, Financials and Real Estate. By the end of December the exposure to Dynamic Total Return Bond Fund was reduced and Canadian corporate bonds were unchanged while the weighting in foreign bonds increased. Overall, the fixed income component was a small detractor to performance.

Among equities the largest sector weightings were in Financials, Information Technology and Communication Services. Financials, Utilities and Information Technology were positive contributors to returns with no notable detractors at the sector level. Over the period, allocations to Consumer Discretionary and Industrials were lowered as Information Technology, Materials and Energy increased. Individual security contributors included Microsoft Corporation and Brookfield Asset Management while no single holding was a significant detractor to returns.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$87.5 million at December 31, 2019, from \$87.2 million at June 30, 2019. This change was composed of investment performance of \$3.1 million, cash distributions of \$0.4 million and net redemptions of \$2.4 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year

mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or are likely to materially affect the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a "Related Broker"). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$4,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which shares of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager may also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when shareholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In

certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Carol S. Perry (Chair), Stephen J. Griggs, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. The main components of compensation are an annual retainer and a fee for each committee meeting attended. The chair of the IRC is entitled to an additional fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Fund received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;

- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Fund relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

- (2) The management expense ratio is based on the total expenses (including sales tax, and excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs) of each series of the Fund and a proportional share of underlying funds' expenses (mutual funds, ETFs and closed-end funds), where applicable, for the stated period and is expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value during the period.
- (3) The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, short borrowing costs and interest on leverage of the Fund and the underlying funds, where applicable, expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value of the Fund during the period.
- (4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fee

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

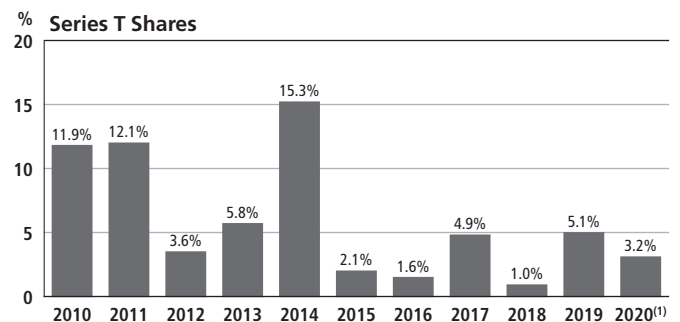
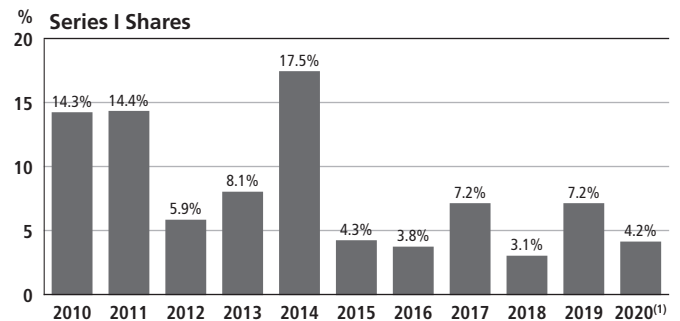
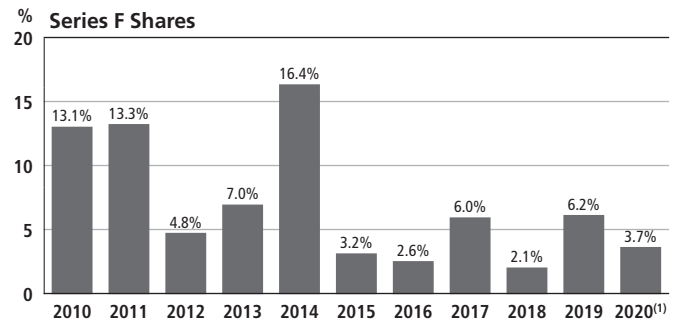
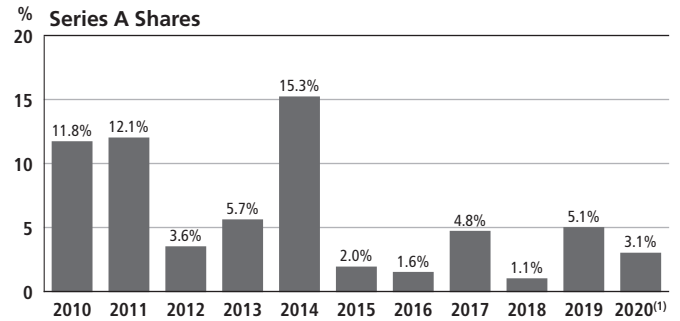
Past Performance
